

Rationale: Why is This Campaign Important?

- Our goal is to create a space where children can use social media while continuously being educated on the dangers of the internet, techniques to stay safe, and actions to take if encountering any suspected danger.
- Provide a free, practical, and equitable resource for children who may not have the education and guidance from parents or guardians about proper cyber behavior and internet safety.
- Encourage social media users to be aware and take action while using the internet through the use of a hashtag because "a hashtag can also tell people more subtlety what to do" (Losh, 2020, p. 62).

"Movements, among other things, are attempts to intervene in the public sphere through collective, coordinated action" (Tufekci, 2018, p.8).

This movement will use a unique hashtag in conjunction with ideas and information about the topic to engage with other users. The safety risks if the internet is not used cautiously will be explained, resources will be provided, and taking action will be encouraged.

How the Campaign Will Work

- Our Campaign is an Instagram account that will provide resources for online safety on social media
- Address topics of cyberbullying, predatory behavior online, and general safety on social media
- Infographics with important information about online safety
- Open DMs
- Anonymous Google Forum
- Advice from Professionals
- In order to give children privacy we will not follow them back on social media

#FastTailedGirls: "Black women use the hashtag to reflect on their girlhoods, sharing stories of being told that they were acting too grown up for their age for undertaking simple everyday behaviors, and having to counter assumptions that they were seeking adult male attention as children" (Jackson, 2020, p. 38)

 We feel as though a campaign that provides resources for online safety could help protect children from being oversexualized online such as the experiences shared by those who participated in the #FastTailedGirls movement.
